FAMDA celebrates our sixtieth birthday in 2013 and will launch the year of celebrations with an Arty-Farty Trivia Party at the Foster Arts Centre on Saturday 16 February.

President, Edwin Coad, is thrilled to announce that FAMDA's first production for the year will be the highly original musical, 'The Last 5 Years', a contemporary song-cycle musical which chronicles the relationship between two New Yorkers - Cathy, a struggling actress, and her novelist husband, Jamie.

What gives the show its emotional punch is the unusual chronological style: Cathy's story starts at the end of their marriage and works its way back, while Jamie's story starts with their first meeting and moves forward in time.

Cathy's first song shows her hurting at the break-up of the relationship whereas Jamie's first song is a salsa full of optimism after his first date with Cathy five years earlier. Their songs alternate as solos and intersect only when they marry midway through the musical.

Jason Robert Brown wrote this unusual musical. He has been hailed as one of Broadway's smartest and most sophisticated current songwriters on account of his extraordinary, jubilant theatre music which includes '13' being staged at Wonthaggi in May – June.

'The Last Five Years' shows off the sly humour and musical style that have earned Brown two Drama Desk Awards for best music and lyrics. The show has echoes of Jewish folk music, jazz and gospel. It's both accessible and likeable.

David Tattersall is directing this emotionally powerful and intimate musical for FAMDA.

Two actor / singers are needed to bring the show to life. Rather unusually for a musical there is no dancing requirement. Cathy and Jamie should both be aged in their late 20s or

30s and both will need exceptional skills as singers and actors. Auditions will be held at the Foster Arts Centre on Sunday 13 January. For more information about the show intending auditionees can contact the production manager, Dianne Paragreen, on raphoto@dcsi.net.au, 5682 2421 or 0407 883 600.

A documentary on a former Miss Wyoming who is charged with abducting and imprisoning a young Mormon Missionary.

Errol Morris' mind-boggling study of boundless obsession starts with the notorious 1978 kidnapping in the U.K. of a Mormon missionary by former Wyoming beauty queen Joyce Kinney. The lurid details made headlines round the world and turned her into a one-woman media circus.

Employing his trusty Interrotron to inveigle his interviewees into revealing long-buried secrets, the filmmaker attempts to cut through the ambiguities of the story caused by conflicting personal accounts, doctored documents, misleading photographs and, of course, the inevitable gleeful tabloid inventions. Kinney's 168-point IQ makes her capable of self-delusion on a jaw-dropping scale, yet does nothing to prevent her getting her wings scorched again when, after several years of seclusion, she becomes embroiled in a second, even weirder tale.

Moving beyond the sick, sad, and smirk-inducing aspects of the film, director Morris makes serious points about the power of the yellow press to shape and destroy lives, if we have not already done it for ourselves. As usual with his films, the on-screen revelations are enhanced by highly creative graphics, and those little pauses that combine to tinge the madness with more than a little melancholy.
